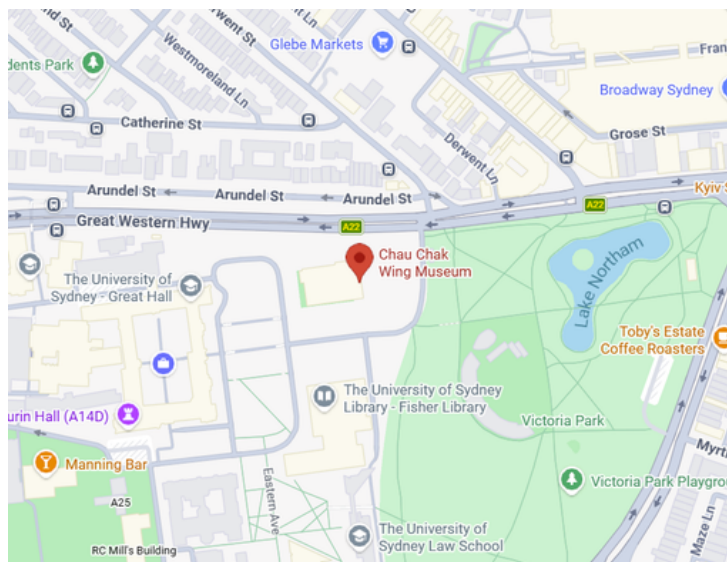

Keynote speakers



Professor Gang Chen serves as the dean of the School of Journalism and Communication and director of the Creative Communication Management Research Center at Peking University. He mainly engages in digital development, digital marketing communication and advertising research. Professor Chen holds a Bachelor of Arts, Master of Arts (Major in Aesthetics), and Doctor of Philosophy (Major in Aesthetics) degrees, all earned from the Department of Philosophy at Peking University. As one of the representatives in the development of China's advertising industry, he proposes the original theoretical systems such as "Developmental Advertising Studies" and "Creative Communication Management", which are the important theories and works in the relevant fields with wide influence. His honors and awards include being selected as a Distinguished Young Scholar in the New Century by the Ministry of Education of PRC and one of Peking University's Top Ten Outstanding Teachers



Professor David B. Nieborg is a Professor of Media Studies at the University of Toronto. He held fellowships with the Jackman Humanities Institute and the Institute for Advanced Study in Princeton. His previous affiliations include MIT, the Queensland University of Technology, the Chinese University of Hong Kong, Utrecht University, and the University of Amsterdam. David published on the game industry, app and platform economics, and game journalism in academic outlets such as *New Media & Society*, *Social Media + Society*, *Internet Policy Review*, and *Platforms & Society*. He is the co-author of *Platforms and Cultural Production* (Polity, 2021), which is translated in Italian and Chinese, and *Mainstreaming and Game Journalism* (MIT Press, 2023).
